

## Remembering our founding President

COLUMBIA COLLEGE and the Columbia College Foundation both owe their start to the vision and commitment of the late Dr. Harvey “Dusty” Rhodes. The college’s founder and first president passed away in August at the age of 96.

Not many individuals have had such a positive, far-reaching impact on their community, said his colleague and close friend Paul Becker. “He didn’t just build a college,” said Becker, who worked with Dr. Rhodes as Columbia’s first Dean of Students. “He brought all that a college brings—art, music, intellectual activities.”

At the time, starting a campus in such a remote, rural area was rare, yet Dr. Rhodes knew what it would take—a true partnership with the community. He gathered input regularly and listened with care. That’s why one of their first projects when Becker arrived was to form the Columbia College Foundation. They launched it in 1972 with a broad-based community board and a vision to support the needs of the college. The fledgling foundation started raising money for scholarships and equipment, then went on to launch an ambitious campaign to raise \$450,000 for the future Oak Pavilion.

Throughout those projects, Dr. Rhodes kept students as his top priority. A sign over his door made that clear, Becker recalled. It read “Students may interrupt at any time. Visitors will understand.”

## A remarkable life: Pat Dean (1935-2014)

EDUCATION WAS a life passion for Pat Dean. As a nurse, teacher and community leader, she was an especially effective advocate for Columbia College. She served nearly 10 years on the Foundation board and was a trustee for the Yosemite Community College District for seven years.

As a parent who returned to school when her children were young, Pat Dean had a special interest in promoting and supporting scholarships, especially those for girls entering nursing and women returning to school. “We’ve lost a remarkable woman,” said her friend and Foundation Vice President Colette Such. “We will miss her energy, her dedication and her leadership.”

## Emily Lang is paying it forward

IT'S BEEN THREE YEARS since Emily Lang put the past behind her and remade her life. As a single mother with four children, she wanted to do better for her family than what she described as a dead-end job and a crippling pattern of bad choices and bad breaks. She was determined to show her children what it means to commit to a goal and keep persisting.

From the day she walked onto the Columbia College campus, Emily discovered how many people want to help her family make that journey. Supportive teachers and counselors, community groups and donors have provided steady encouragement. In April 2014, Lang received scholarships from the Osher Foundation, the Molly Cunningham family, and P.E.O. Sisterhood, Chapter T.P.

"Those awards have really kept me going," she said. "I want donors to know this will get paid forward in our community."

Her mom showed her how.

"I knew I would love it here," Lauren said. "Seeing my mom do so well here gives me more confidence that I can succeed."

## Don Schaffner Scholarship: a new family tradition

SHERYL SCHAFFNER remembers clearly how encouraging it was for her to get a modest scholarship when she was a student at Columbia College 25 years ago. Now an environmental law attorney in Sunnyvale, she was the first person in her family to go to college. "I feel like I owe everything to Columbia College," she said. "It gave me that foot in the door."

So when her father, Don Schaffner, passed

away a little over a year ago, she thought establishing a scholarship at Columbia would be the perfect way to honor his memory. Sheryl worked with the Foundation staff to complete some simple paperwork and designed criteria for the new award. Family and friends contributed small amounts that added up to enough to assure that the scholarship can be awarded for at least five years, and Sheryl plans to continue to donate as well. She helped review applicants, and especially enjoyed attending the April scholarship celebration to meet the first recipient, Edwin Bobrycki.

"That was a delightful opportunity to get to meet the person in whose future you're investing and to see what a nice man he is," Sheryl said. "We all immediately connected and it made us feel even better about setting up the scholarship. I absolutely know my dad is proud of what we did."

## Campus mini grants boost student success

DEBATE CAMP, automotive test fees, volleyball equipment, cameras for telescopes and a choir trip were among the projects funded by the Columbia College Foundation's campus mini grant program in the 2014 school year.

Seventeen grants were awarded this year, totaling \$21,500 in support for projects benefitting students in all corners of the campus. Now in its third year, the mini grant program was launched by a gift from the Wise Family Charitable Trust and continues to go strong. Faculty, staff and students submit requests twice a year for projects they want most for the campus.

"It's rewarding to see what a difference small grants can make to students' experiences here at Columbia," said board member Mike Heuton, who chairs

the mini grant committee.

Fire instructor Shane Warner used mini grants to help upgrade fire academy equipment and safety gear.

"We have a demanding program and do all we can to give our students a professional, supportive experience," Warner said. "As a result, more than 90 percent of our graduates get placed in good, professional jobs. The Foundation's grants help keep our program in top shape."

# Fiscal Report



THE COLUMBIA COLLEGE FOUNDATION is a 501(c)3 non-profit organization dedicated to raising supplemental funds to support student success and promote quality higher education in our community. Established by Dr. Harvey “Dusty” Rhodes in 1972, the Foundation today has an all-volunteer community board that works to raise the profile of the c-ollege and expand partnerships with organizations, businesses and individuals who believe in the value of high-quality, accessible public education.

Foundation income supports a variety of college programs and activities each year, and the Foundation oversees the financial management of more than \$1.16 million in assets. Assets consist of cash, investments and collections held in unrestricted funds, restricted funds and endowments. An annual audit of finances and record-keeping is conducted by a third-party auditor.



## Community Outreach




An expert panel discusses urgent water issues at the March community forum. Professor Tom Hofstra (standing, right) serves as moderator.
