

## The story behind the EOPS logo: The Nickel and the Nail

IN NOVEMBER 1971, THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE OF THE CALIFORNIA COMMUNITY COLLEGE EOPS ASSOCIATION (CCCEOPSA) ADOPTED THE NICKEL AND THE NAIL AS THE SYMBOL OF AID OFFERED TO MANY CALIFORNIA COMMUNITY COLLEGE STUDENTS THROUGH EOPS. THIS SYMBOL, THE EOPS LOGO, REPRESENTS A SUCCESSFUL EFFORT AT HELPING TO PROVIDE THE MOTIVATION AND MEANS FOR STUDENTS TO REACH THEIR EDUCATIONAL ROMS.



#### HERE IS THE STORY:

A YOUNG MAN IN THE DEEP SOUTH WAS WALKING DOWN A DUSTY ROAD TO VISIT A LADY FRIEND, ALL TOO AWARE THAT THE NICKEL IN HIS POCKET WAS ALL HE HAD IN THE WORLD. On Saturday, April 9, from 12-4pm at Carkeet Pak at the college campus, we held Native Voices: Showbasing Indigenous Hip Hop. This was the fourth event of its kind but was the first of its size and kind at the college ever. We had food vendors, vendors (informational and merchandise), and the event was free to the public. It began with a cultural dence damonatration from Tuolumne MeWaik dencers feel by Carlos Geledorff. Then, we got to hear an academic lecture from Dr. Melisse Leal (Ohlone) about Native Hip Hop. There were three performances, at by Indigenous artists. Richis Leaf regis (Minerk & Nissanani), Cake (Ean) Leany) and Hos Savage Fam (Including Stake 6; Elem Perno, Lit Jim, Noklack, and others), and Frank Waln (Slosinga Lekota). There is a great write up in the Union Democrat (By Guy McCarthy, published April 13, 2022) if you have a chance fo read it.

This was an opportunity to bring the campus and community together and learn more about insuse impacting Native people. There is a huge disconnect of Native histories being tought or shared in public school systems, and these events are a way to lear about tribal nation experiences and history from Native people directly. This particular event is expanding on our previous "Rectures" and trying to share other methods of sharing those stories and experiences in a way to connect with many.

We could not have had this event without all the many volunteers from our college staff, administrators, and faculty. There were students and community members who volunteered, too. The event was appresend by the Cultural Enrichment Committee, Extended Opportunity Program & Services (EDPS) Program, the Tuolumne Me-Wok Tribe, the Chicken Ranch Tribe of Me-Wuk Indians, and Devis-King & Associates. We have received positive Feedback and hope to make this a yearly event!
